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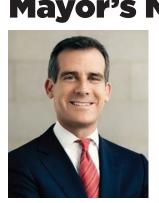

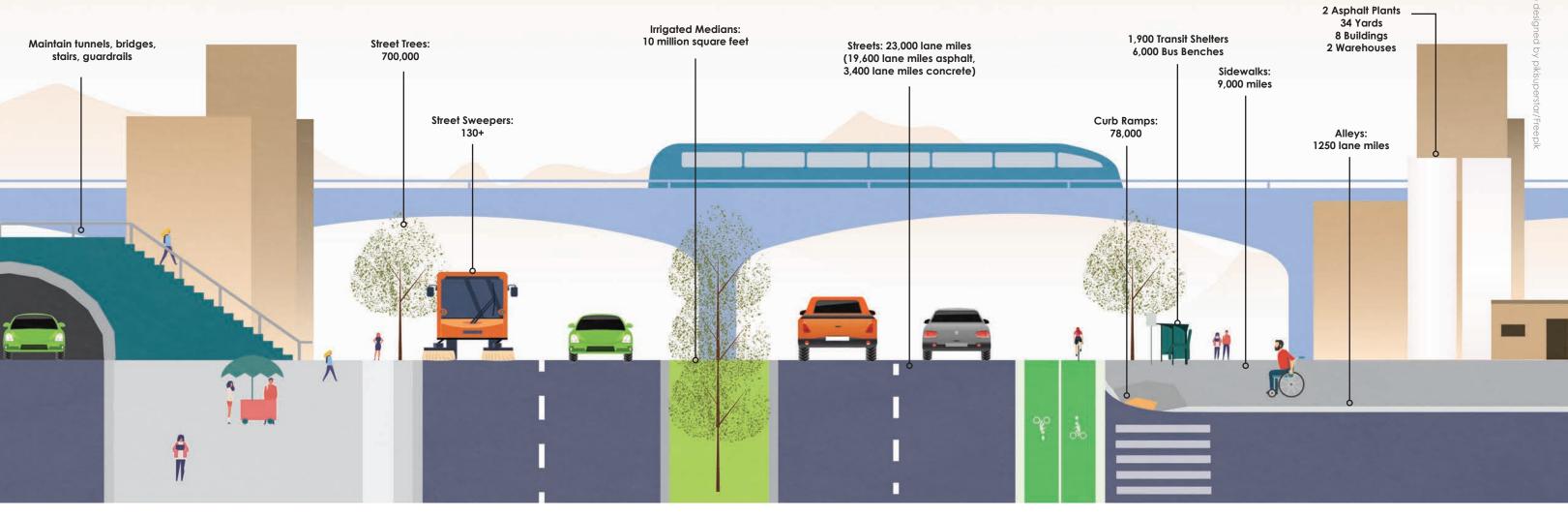

## **StreetsLA Reimagined**

This is the second update to a 5-year strategic plan that seeks to integrate the many goals and objectives and responsibilities of StreetsLA to increase the effectiveness and resiliency of the organization while delivering world-class services. StreetsLA will provide the best-in-class, transparent, fully engaged, and equity-focused services.

Operationally, StreetsLA is becoming a modern organization reliant on data to make informed decisions. Mapping and analyzing our asset portfolio will guide decision makers to better allocate resources and budget as needed. To that end, a focus on asset management and advanced planning will transform the way the organization handles daily and future workloads to be more efficient and targeted. StreetsLA is also developing a baseline toward a more sustainable operations. In FY 20-21, StreetsLA measured our carbon emissions and air pollution emissions from operations, and achieved an 11% reduction in fleet carbon emissions.

### GRANTS PROGRAM



Ana Tabuena-Ruddy, Project Development & Interagency Coordination Manager

#### Can you give us an overview of the program?

The grants program begins with identifying a community's needs and vision and then working with various partners to help bring this vision to life. The program requires a large team of people (planners, engineers, landscape architects, management analysts, construction crews, etc.) from inception to implementation, and involves community and key stakeholder engagement as well as inter-agency coordination. The grant program has grown exponentially in the last year, due to recent grant awards doubling StreetsLA's portfolio to nearly \$300M. While StreetsLA's previous focus was primarily on active transportation, we have also recently expanded into more urban greening and stormwater capture grants, uniquely positioning StreetsLA to deliver holistic projects in the City's street network.

#### What is your role in this program/initiative and why it is important to you?

My role is to develop community-informed streetscape projects and seek large-scale grant funding in the range of \$20M to \$50M to implement them. This involves coordination with various City agencies, Council Offices, key stakeholders, and outside City partners, such as Metro and consultants who assist in community engagement and/or grant writing. It also involves training staff in cost estimating, feasibility reviews, and writing compelling narratives tailored to each grant source. A major part of my role is ensuring that a community's vision and needs are reflected and prioritized throughout the development of the grant project, assessing the feasibility of the proposals, and assembling a competitive grant package so that their vision can become a reality. I find it extremely gratifying to help historically disadvantaged communities express their needs, dream big, and identify the financial resources and inter-agency partnerships to make their dreams possible.

#### How does this program/initiative benefit StreetsLA and/or the City of Los Angeles?

The grants program directly benefits both StreetsLA and the City of Los Angeles in numerous ways by being a self-supporting revenue-generating program that does not have to rely on City funds, easing financial burden on the City especially critical during these challenging times. The size of recent grant awards have also made it possible to deliver upon the Mayor's Green New Deal in a transformative scale, enabling StreetsLA to address environmental, economic, and social inequities in communities that have not seen any investments in decades by providing urban greening and reduction in greenhouse gas emissions, creating jobs and stimulating local economy, and building recreational and cultural placemaking opportunities.

#### STREET FURNITURE

#### Can you please describe the program?

The City's "Transit Furniture Section" is responsible for the management and oversight of two separate City-wide programs. The Coordinated Street Furniture Program operated through a contract with OUTFRONT JC Decaux, LLC furnishes the City with transit (bus) shelters with litter receptacles, automated public toilets, newsstand vending kiosks, and public amenity kiosks. The "Bus Bench Program" operated through a contract with InSite Street Media, LLC furnishes the City with bus benches and litter receptacles. Both Programs are completely selfsupported financially through revenues generated from advertisements displayed on media panels incorporated into the transit furniture structures which means no City funds are expended to provide these important services. In addition to covering the costs to fabricate, install, maintain, and operate the furniture, both Programs furnish revenues to the City annually some of which are reinvested in transit related improvements. The Coordinated Street Furniture Program consists of 1870 transit shelters with litter receptacles, 197 public amenity kiosks, 14 automated public toilets, and 4 newsstand vending kiosks; in direct response to the COVID pandemic, the Program also furnished and maintained 320 hand sanitizer dispensers at our busiest bus stops, two fully plumbed prototype handwashing stations and a prototype hydration station within the past year. The Bus Bench Program consists of 6,000 bus benches, over 2,000 litter receptacles, and is in the process of developing and installing 300 shade structures to furnish shade and comfort at bus stop locations that are unable to receive a traditional transit shelter.

#### What is your role in this program and why it is important to you?

I am the City's lead administrator and manager of both Programs and believe my role is important in four major ways. Number one is ensuring much needed shade, shelter, seating, safety, and comfort, for transit users and pedestrians alike are provided to the greatest extent possible in an equitable, fair manner. Number two is to ensure all of our transit furniture is well maintained in good working order at all times. Number three is to ensure both Programs are responsive to the needs of Los Angeles' constituents. Number four is to ensure both programs are leveraged to provide Los Angeles with the maximum benefits, services, and revenues achievable in the most fiscally responsible, efficient manner.





## Complete Streets

As part of the Mayor's Complete Streets Program, StreetsLA improves safety and mobility along boulevards by performing roadway, curb, and gutter repairs in order to enhance the safety of motorists, pedestrians, and cyclists on city streets.







### RACIAL/GENDER EQUITY

#### Can you give us an overview of the program?

The mission of the program and StreetsLA is to Enhance the Quality of Life for All. Inclusivity is a core principle of our culture, where all ideas are welcome, all efforts are encouraged, and all of our staff is valued for their contributions. StreetsLA embraces this opportunity to create a blueprint for a future fee of racial and gender inequity.

#### What is your role in this program and why it is important to you?

I serve as lead under Stephanie Clements, Gender Equity Officer for the Bureau of Street Services. This role is important to me to promote equity across the board, a culture of inclusion within the office and staff, and equitable services for the residents of the City of Los Angeles.

#### How does this program/initiative benefit StreetsLA and/or the City of Los Angeles?

This program benefits StreetsLA by assessing inequities within the department. By knowing where we are lacking, we can improve and change the environment. Creating dialogue within the department and including all staff to contribute with their ideas, comments, and suggestions to our work environment and dynamic will benefit the City of Los Angeles.

#### What are your hopes in the post-COVID recovery for your program?

During the post-COVID recovery, being able to meet in-person or attend staff and tail gate meetings to do outreach for the program and get more people involved will help with the communications barriers especially the breakdown in communication from administrative to field staff.

Service delivery post COVID recovery will allow the Bureau to conduct outreach and education to Los Angeles residents on a one-on-one basis and enable neighborhood collaborations to assess area-specific needs.

#### TREE PLANTING



**Hector Banuelos**. Street Tree Superintendent I

#### Can you please describe the program?

The tree planting program plants approximately 1,000 trees annually throughout the City. The newly planted trees include trees planted as part of the Tree Planting Guarantee Fee, Design Build projects, and other tree planting endeavors coordinated with many of the Council Districts.

#### What is your role in this program/initiative and why it is important to you?

I oversee the crews performing the tree planting and work with various Division Managers, Council Deputies, and stakeholders. Planting new street trees adds value to properties and it's important to replace trees that die and are removed to help the City to sustain the age diversity of our urban forest while maintaining and/or increasing tree canopy needed for the environmental benefits trees provide.

#### How does this program benefit the City of Los Angeles?

The program helps to provide trees in canopy deficient communities and give communities a sense of identity while providing many environmental and aesthetic benefits. The benefits include, but are not limited to shade, wildlife habitat carbon seauestration



increase in property value, and a multitude of other environmental and aesthetic benefits.

#### What are your hopes in the post-COVID recovery for your program?

I'm hopeful that the world recovers from the current pandemic and resources will continue to be provided for planting and watering of trees so that the City can sustain healthy tree canopy and a healthy urban forest.





## COVID-19 RESPONSE



**Nikia Drinkard**, Emergency Operations Manager

#### Can you give us an overview of the program?

As the Bureau's Emergency Operations
Manager, I am responsible for the development,
coordination, and implementation of emergency
and disaster preparedness, response recovery,
and non-structural hazard mitigation programs,
processes, and procedures Citywide or for
StreetsLA, including drills and exercises designed to
validate emergency plans, operating procedures,
and operating guidelines.

## What is your role in this program and why it is important to you?

My role in this program is to administer or coordinate the StreetsLA emergency management program, including developing, analyzing, or revising emergency response or recovery plans, training programs, and exercises for large-scale natural or human-caused disasters. I am also the 24/7 Emergency Point of Contact (POC) for the Bureau. As the POC for the Bureau, I am responsible for submitting requests for muchneeded and hard-to-source PPEs.

## How does this program benefit StreetsLA and/or the City of Los Angeles?

This program is designed to meet the Mayor's Mandate for Bureau-wide emergency preparedness and disaster mitigation. StreetsLA is tasked with maintaining a debris management plan to facilitate response and recovery as needed

## What are your hopes in the post-COVID recovery for your program?

My hopes for the post -COVID recovery is to continue the monitoring of PPE burn rates for potential reimbursement from FEMA and to return to in-person weeklong training offered by CAL OES (California Governor's Office of Emergency Services).

## SIDEWALK VENDING



David Rivera Chief Street Services Investigator I

#### Can you give us an overview of the program?

It is a regulated program which encourages micro entrepreneurship and an economic opportunity for people to support their families.

#### What is your role in this program and why it is important to you?

I manage the program. It is important in that we want to make sure that everyone has the opportunity to support themselves and their families.

#### How does this program benefit StreetsLA and/ or the City of Los Angeles?

With it being a regulated program it allows everyone the opportunity to flourish within the City of Los Angeles and increases vendor accountability by identifying out of compliance vendors.

#### What are your hopes in the post-COVID recovery for your program?

That more permits are obtained and the vendors are able to obtain their required permits and compliant food carts soon.

### COOL NEIGHBORHOODS

#### Can you give us an overview of the project?

The Cool Neighborhoods Project brings shade trees and cool pavement coatings to residential neighborhoods experiencing extreme heat. The program uses an equity lens to focus on underserved communities which face significant environmental challenges. Shaded bus stops can also be added to these projects.

## What is your role in this program and why it is important to you?

I launched this program in 2015 around the time I assumed the newly-created role of Chief Sustainability Officer for StreetsLA. At the time, what we were doing was experimental and at a very small scale. It has been very rewarding to see this program grow and enable Los Angeles to play a leadership role in how cities are going to adapt to a warming world.

## How does this project benefit the City of Los Angeles?

LA is hot and is only getting hotter. These projects address heat resiliency and tree canopy equity, both of which are key elements of the Mayor's Green New Deal.

## What are your hopes in the post-COVID recovery for this project?

We plan on a robust community engagement process in our pilot areas. We have the ability to tailor improvements based on stakeholder feedback and want local residents to feel ownership of the project.



## TREE INVENTORY



Elias Najar, Tree Surgeon Supervisor I

#### Can you give us an overview of the program?

StreetsLA has contracted with Davey Resource Group to conduct an inventory of an estimated 700,000 sites consisting of trees, stumps, and vacant planting locations across approximately 100 Neighborhood council districts. The inventory will gather information on the species and condition of the trees which will aid Urban Forestry Division (UFD) in the management of the urban forest by strategizing and scheduling tree planting and maintenance needs. The inventory system, TreeKeeper, is available to the public online at laparksca.treekeepersoftware. com/. The MyLA311 service will also be integrated into TreeKeeper, making it an efficient management

#### What is your role in this program and why it is important to you?

I was selected to work with Davey Resource Group and StreetsLA's IT team to develop a user-friendly tree inventory and management system and train UFD staff on how to use the new system in the field. I also created training videos online in English and Spanish while in-person training was suspended. The Tree Inventory program is important because it will help our staff to manage, improve, and create a safer urban forest in the City of Los Angeles. I am honored to be given the opportunity to be involved with the development and implementation teams.

#### How does this program benefit StreetsLA?

This inventory will help StreetsLA develop management goals and metrics, manage tree related projects, provide educational information to the public, and receive feedback from stakeholders and constituents.

#### What are your hopes in the post-COVID recovery for your program?

Our hope is to increase in-person training for our field staff on how to utilize the inventory system and to complete the tree inventory for the entire City.





## STREET SWEEPING PROGRAM



**Brent Jones**, Cleaning Manager Acting Superintendent I

#### Can you give us an overview of the program?

Due to the financial crisis of the COVID-19 pandemic and the resulting Citywide hiring freeze, staff shortages necessitate that we reduce the frequency of street sweeping: routes that had received weekly sweeping will now be swept biweekly.

StreetsLA also rolled out the Street Sweeping Near Me, which notifies residents when their address will receive street sweeping.

Once residents sign up online, they will receive an email notification 24 hours and 48 hours before their route is scheduled to be swept.

By keeping routes free of parked cars, our sweepers can better access the curb where debris collects, and keep our streets cleaner.

## What are your hopes in the post-COVID recovery for your program?

In the post Covid recovery time I hope that we get more residents signed up for the notification system. Also I would like the notifications to not only be emailed to the residents but also sent by text message.

We are starting an optimization study to plan a future expansion of the sweeping program and clean more streets in the City.





## Advanced Planning & Asset/Grants Management (APA/GM) Division

The Advanced Planning & Asset/Grants Management (APA/GM) Division is responsible for developing and managing StreetsLA's asset management framework to ensure it aligns with the Bureau's vision, mission, and policy. The focus is on the business processes for resource allocation and utilization with the objective of better decision-making based on quality information regarding the assets and well-defined objectives expressed as "Levels of Service." It can be understood as getting the best results of performance for the

preservation, improvement, and operation of infrastructure assets given the resources available. The key principles of Asset Management represent a way of doing business. When fully implemented, an Asset Management program will build, preserve, and operate street services more costeffectively with improved asset performance, deliver to customers the best value for public tax dollars spent, and enhance the credibility and accountability of StreetsLA to all stakeholders.

APA/GM is responsible for the strategic fiscal management of a \$200 million grant portfolio with a variety of federal-aid, state, and local funding sources, including ensuring invoicing, quarterly reporting, and earned value tracking are administered effectively. Long term goals include the development of new capital projects to capture a holistic streetscape vision for the city to improve equitable mobility, greening, and cultural identity for all Angelenos.



## COMMERCIAL VEHICLE SIMULATOR (TRAINING)



Leonel Chacon, Street Services Supervisor I

#### Can you give us an overview of the program?

The Commercial Vehicle simulator is a tool used within the Street Services Commercial Vehicle Section Driving Proficiency Development project. The simulator allows participants to encounter various commercial driving scenarios in a safe, controlled virtual setting. The simulator complements the classroom instruction and hands-on driving experience. The simulator is versatile, allowing for several preset driving scenarios and modifying the experience on the fly. The divisions schedule their Heavy Duty Truck Operators to attend the one-day training sessions. The one-day session includes Pre-trip inspection Review, load securement in a classroom followed by hands-on load securement exercises, hands-on driving of a Class A or Class B vehicle on a prescribed route through the city, and time on the Simulator.

## What is your role in this program and why it is important to you?

In 2020, I was assigned to deploy the Commercial Vehicle Section Program. This included reviewing, creating content, collaborating with divisions for resources needed for the hands-on experience, creating, and maintaining the session schedule. I was selected because of my years of experience, education, and ability to educate others. It is important to me because I am helping to increase the proficiency of the Heavy Duty Truck Drivers, something that has been long overdue. I look forward to the second phase of our proficiency plan, which opens up to our Equipment Operators

## How does this program benefit StreetsLA and/or the City of Los Angeles?

The Commercial Vehicle Section Driving Proficiency
Development project is, in part, an answer to the identified
commercial vehicle skills gap seen in pockets of our
division heavy Duty truck operators. This is evidenced by
empirical information found by interviews and spot checks
performed in the field. We have developed the project to
bridge awareness and skill gap and increase proficiency.
The simulator plays a key role in developing awareness of
driving conditions in the safe, controlled virtual environment.
The simulator also plays a big role in the Bureau's Workforce
development program by providing a tool and a resource to
aid anyone who wants help in the promotion process.





## External Relations Team

The External Relations Team is responsible for the interdepartmental, Council, Mayoral, and Board relations and public facing interactions between the Bureau and outside agencies in public policy, stakeholder relations, customer service interactions, outreach, and education as well as internal staff engagement through gender and racial equity initiatives and Department-wide communications efforts. The team serves as the primary point of contact between Angelenos and StreetsLA through social media, StreetsLA website, direct phone contact, email, and virtual and in-person meetings, responding to questions and concerns, conducting public meetings, and serving as a liaison between stakeholders and the Bureau.

## Financial Management Division

The Financial Management Division (FMD) manages and controls all of the Bureau's finances, including payroll, procurement, cost accounting and revenue billings, and is responsible for planning, developing, implementing, and monitoring the Annual Budget, as well as handling interim fiscal changes, mandates, and Council actions throughout the year.



## Administration Division

The Administration Division is responsible for Bureau-wide administrative functions, including contract administration. employee training and development, human resources support and position control, and grant administration. The division also develops and implements policies/initiatives such as those pertaining to gender and racial equity, reconstitution plan, telecommuting plan, and ethics/ conflict of interest.

#### FARMERS MARKET



Cuauhtémoc (Temo) Llanes, Lieutenant Senior Street Services Investigator II

#### Can you give us an overview of the program?

The Farmers Market program reduces the local farmers' financial burden and provides locally sourced nuts, fruits, and vegetables to the community directly from the producer. One payment offers a permit for a whole fiscal year. The Farmer Markets gives a unique opportunity to unite the local communities by providing a great variety of fresh local food to all customers.

#### What is your role in this program and why it is important to you?

My role in the Farmer's market program is as a City of Los Angeles liaison between the applicants and all City Departments. In addition, I regulate the permitting process by answering any questions, providing guidance, and finalizing the permit.

#### How does this program benefit StreetsLA and/or the City of Los Angeles?

Farmer's Markets is one of the very few programs that could continue functioning with an active permit throughout the COVID-19 Pandemic. Through CDC guideline adherence and implementations, Farmer's Markets safely provided a much-needed sense of community in an otherwise experience of isolation.

#### What are your hopes in the post-COVID recovery for your program?

Our hopes and goals are to continue to provide neighborhoods with a positive and uplifting experience with an even greater sense of community to help us move forward.

#### Sustainability

With an eye towards reducing air pollution and in response to the climate emergency, we successfully developed a fleet GHG and criteria pollutant baseline model to identify hotspots to reduce our impact.

Through a combination of operational efficiencies, piloting and procuring ZEV and hybrid vehicles, and piloting renewable fuels, our fleet emissions were reduced by 10%.

The first all-electric mini sweeper is specifically designed to clean narrow protected bike lanes and thereby using a zero-emission sweeper to support zero emission transportation.



#### Tree Summit

More than 300 people attended our third annual Tree Summit, focused on the science and strategies of proper tree watering.



#### **Tree Inventory**

StreetsLA inventoried 390,000 tree locations in 39 Neighborhood Council areas.

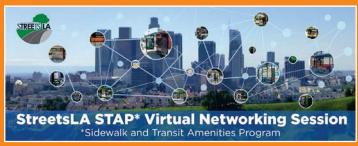

#### Sidewalk and Transit Amenities Program (STAP)

Development of an innovative Sidewalk and Transit Amenities Program (STAP) is underway, expected to provide at least 3,000 bus shelters across the City, among other street furniture installations.

A series of public information sessions attended by more than 600 people and an interactive online map have engaged the public to identify possible improvements to the program.

#### **Bike Network Expansion**

By reprioritizing our paving schedules, StreetsLA has enabled the establishment of 52.25 miles of resurfacing and 15.07 lane miles of slurry for new bike lanes, including the bike and bus lanes on 7th Street in Downtown LA.

#### Street Sweeping Near Me

StreetsLA launched the Street Sweeping Near Me platform which allows the public to sign up for notifications of sweeping scheduled in their neighborhood. While this is meant to assist in the transition from weekly to biweekly sweeping, a schedule change necessitated by the staff shortages and financial crisis of the COVID-19 pandemic, it is also part of our vision for a sweeping program that will expand to clean even more areas of the City.

### SUSTAINABILITY & RESILIENCY

As we begin the new decade, the City of Los Angeles will be faced with monumental environmental and societal challenges. The global climate crisis will result in more frequent extreme weather events in our communities — ranging from drought and wildfires to sea-level rise and coastal flooding. As the primary agency responsible for preserving, protecting, and maintaining our street network and urban forest, StreetsLA is invested in strategies and actions that address our greatest risks while protecting our most vulnerable people, places, and systems. To support the city's environment, StreetsLA will integrate green infrastructure such as stormwater capture, urban canopy, and bioswales into its streetscape projects. These improvements will protect our residents and infrastructure from the effects of extreme weather by reducing the urban heat island effect, restoring the health of our greenways and waterways, protecting our unique biodiversity, and improving the condition of our air quality. Moreover, StreetsLA will reduce the carbon footprint of the Bureau's operation by developing a roadmap to evaluate and reduce its fleet's environmental impact while also testing green technologies and materials to minimize GHG emissions. Collectively, these activities will not only advance the bureau's commitment to sustainability but prepare our street networks and urban forest for ecological resilience.

Through the principles of integration, innovation, and inclusion, StreetsLA will improve the Bureau's capacity for resiliency by systematically tracking the Bureau's functions and assets, supporting the life cycle of the city's streets and urban forests with proper maintenance and management, and encouraging the use of innovative best practices and technology. With these approaches in practice, StreetsLA will be better equipped to prioritize the bureau's essential assets and functions in moments of unforeseen shocks and stressors. StreetsLA's use of data-driven methods to oversee the life cycle of its assets will enable the bureau to maximize infrastructure investments and prioritize improvements. The oversight of StreetsLA's essential street infrastructure and the urban forest is crucial in managing risk and for facilitating our streetscapes resilience.



#### **GOAL 1**

#### Advance One Infrastructure framework to develop and showcase holistic and multibenefit projects

- Convert at least two road medians or publicly owned parkway strips to low or no-water use landscaping
- Integrate **green infrastructure elements** into at least **five projects**, such as green streets and alleys that feature bioswales, infiltration cutouts, permeable pavement, street trees, and other best-inclass solutions
- Prioritize **key neighborhoods for stormwater capture** and develop funding strategies (CNRA's Urban Greening, Measure W, Prop 68, etc.) to connect stormwater capture to projects
- Develop **Inter-Agency agreement** to ensure green and blue infrastructure elements include maintenance plans

#### **GOAL 2**

## Reduce the carbon footprint and criteria pollutant emissions of our operations and materials

- Evaluate and develop a roadmap to Zero Carbon Impact operations from operations to procurement strategy
- Develop a **Circular Economy framework** for materials, recycling operations including Zero-Emission Transportation, Zero Emission Processing, and high-value eco-friendly product(s)
- Pilot new hybrid street sweepers and Bio-NG powered dump trucks toward the goal to convert 100% of city street sweepers to alternative fuels or ZEVs by 2025 and all dump trucks to lower carbon intensive fuels or ZEVs by 2030
- Evaluate and develop a **roadmap** for reducing the carbon footprint of the pavement life cycle

#### GOAL 3

#### Improve the health of our Urban Forest and enhance the urban canopy

- Complete citywide street tree inventory by the end of 2022
- In partnership with City Plants, contribute to **Urban Forest Financing Study** for funding Best Management Practices for tree care and considering canopy expansion
- In collaboration with City Forestry Officer, establish a **framework** to improve coordination for tree maintenance activities
- Update **tree planting selection and site considerations** that increase tree establishment success rates and reduce maintenance and liability
- Plant at least 1,000 street trees by 2028 in priority locations consistent with the Mayor's Green New Deal to increase tree canopy in areas of greatest need by at least 50%

#### **GOAL 4**

## Enhance roadway resilience by applying proper maintenance and asset management practices

- Develop an alley condition assessment procedure and recommendations for an ongoing maintenance work program
- Maintain a PCI of 70
- Complete purchase of Asphalt Plant 3 to enhance asphalt production capability





### **SAFETY & PUBLIC HEALTH**

Safety and public health are the top priorities for StreetsLA, and the Bureau continually evaluates the health and safety risks affecting its employees and the communities they serve. To ensure safety in our street networks, StreetsLA is committed to investing resources in pilot programs that advance the working conditions for its employees and improves the overall safety in our streets and sidewalks.

Additionally, the Bureau is dedicated to improving the quality of life and public health in Los Angeles's public realm. To support the livability and comfort of our street networks, StreetsLA strives to meet the needs of the public by providing essential street furniture and shade through urban cooling and tree planting. We prioritize sanitation through our street sweeping operations. By fostering a safe and comfortable streetscape, residents can engage in activities that encourage better physical and mental health outcomes.

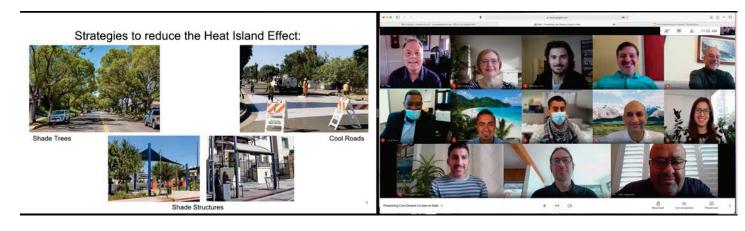

- Develop a **Bureau-wide Worker Safety Recognition Program** with a scoreboard to track incidents and create greater accountability
- Establish a comprehensive **risk management database**
- Develop and implement strategies to maximize liability reduction potential for bike lanes
- In partnership with the City's other sidewalk programs, prioritize and repair 70 sidewalk locations to maximize liability reduction potential
- Hire and train new superintendents to act as **Subject Matter Experts** for the entire Bureau related to litigation

#### GOAL 6

Create programs to mitigate the impact of heat effect and other Public Health needs

- Implement the recommended 200 street segments Cooling Neighborhood Strategy
- Develop a **Conceptual Shade Structure Prototype** for installation over bus benches
- Assess and develop plans that would expand to include **installation and maintenance** of public hydration stations, hand-hygiene stations (as part of the STAP program), and public toilets
- Continue to grow and develop the **Sidewalk and Park Vending Program**, including outreach and engagement to increase compliance, continue COVID precautions as appropriate, support vendor access to County Public Health permits, and double the number of permitted vendors to 3,000

## **ACCESSIBILITY & EQUITY**

As it is reflected in the adopted Mayor's Los Angeles Green New Deal, the Mayor's Resilient Los Angeles Plan, and the Mobility 2035 Plan, Los Angeles is taking the necessary steps to address transit accessibility and equity for all Angelenos. Although Los Angeles is famous for its car culture, the city has increasingly invested in its transit infrastructure more than any other American city in the last two decades. It is important for residents to have access to modern and reliable transit and street furniture amenities in the public realm, and the Bureau of Street Services is honored to manage the City's street and sidewalk network for the increasingly diverse selection of active transportation options residents use to navigate their trips. StreetsLA is taking the necessary actions to enhance the livable streetscape experience to foster a safe environment for all its users — whether it's for pedestrians, bicyclists, or transit users, StreetsLA is continually initiating street and sidewalk programs to ensure that residents have access to streetscape furniture and amenities that are climate adaptive and equitably distributed.

As Los Angeles' most disadvantaged communities are disproportionately affected by the effects of climate change, it is a priority at StreetsLA to ensure that its programs proactively address the health, safety, and environmental concerns of its most affected residents. The Bureau is committed to not only investing in the equitable access and improvements in its streetscape, but will also actively work towards policies and practices within its Bureau to protect the value of the communities it serves regardless of gender, race, age, sexuality or disability.



#### GOAL 8

Encourage the use of public transit and active transportation by creating a program to improve and modernize street furniture and transit amenities

- Execute contract with a qualified and collaborative partner to operate the Sidewalk and Transit Amenities Program
- In partnership with transit agencies (Metro, Dash, etc.), assess condition at all transit stops in the City
- Develop a tiered transit-stop site investment plan to prioritize investment and enhance transit user experience
- Begin installation of **3,000 bus shelters**, an increase from fewer than 1,900 today

- Continue to improve **Community Engagement** efforts to better inform residents about StreetsLA services and to reduce barriers to information

### INNOVATION & INTEGRATION

StreetsLA will use innovation and integration to enhance its work processes and financial resiliency to support continuous organization improvement. In order to meet current and future needs for employment, StreetsLA will cultivate partnerships with local jobtraining agencies and encourage local hiring. By integrating state of the art technologies, StreetsLA will optimize its resources and activities, reduce its dependency on the general fund, and reduce silos among its working groups. Through the use and support of digital infrastructure, StreetsLA can capture the state of the Bureau's assets and project delivery methods, have stronger control over the capital improvement programs, and make better decisions.

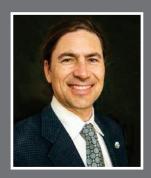
